Why we need to share the practical applications of research

The impact on Practitioners



Communication between academics and practitioners is often limited (unless the practitioner is also an academic)

- This may be because research is disconnected from the day-to-day work of the practitioner and not seen as relevant
- Practitioners may not have access to the literature or time to follow current trends
- Abstracts are openly accessible and a PLS helps when time is limited

Including plain language summaries in abstracts helps bridge this gap



Practitioners & PLS



Plain language summaries (PLS)

71% (47/66) of Healthcare Professionals rated PLS 'very/ extremely useful'.

(International Society for Medical Publication Professionals Europe Meeting 2022)

"Overall, 60% (30/50) of articles with PLS were downloaded significantly more often than those without a PLS."

The impact on Policy Advisers/Makers



- Policy makers and institutional executives may only be interested in recommendations that can easily be understood and applied
- Advisers understand technical language but need to avoid it in their reports
- Plain language summaries can potentially facilitate communication between the so-called 'expert' and those responsible for making decisions and implementing policy



Challenges for implementing policies on sustainability

- 1. Practitioners may see sustainability as 'someone else's concern' and be more interested in research relating to their discipline
- 2. Communication between different 'audiences' (silos) can be limited
- 3. Academic authors may not know how to write for the general reader
- 4. Artificial intelligence could help creating a first draft ...


Current State

Of course, there are **AI tools** available that can create PLSs, but are they accurate enough to put your brand name on content? And how do we keep the cost in-check?





 - policy/practical bullet points
 - plain language summaries
- support these with video, infographics, social media posts
